# Ecstatic naturalism

Corrington has described his main life focus as the "development of a philosophical perspective called 'ecstatic naturalism'." This perspective attempts to provide an alternative to contemporary metaphysical perspectives such as materialism on the one side and process theology on the other. In ecstatic naturalism theres exists nothing except nature, although the term nature assumes a much wider meaning than it has within the narrow confines of reductionist materialism, which happens to coincide with today's western consensus reality. It follows from this that psi phenomena have a quite natural etiology, however one not fully understood in the contemporary scientific paradigm

Dr. Corrington's research involves an interdisciplinary approach to problems of meaning, semiotics, and unconscious processes in the self/world correlation. His long-time interest in parapsychology is focused most recently on the issue of how the unconscious, in its various modes, interacts with the forms of semiosis (sign transmission) that occur in psi phenomena.
